From Pastor Miller

I just finished reading an interesting devotional. It was about a person, recognized within the church as an important part of our Christian history. It was about Katharina von Bora Luther, also called Catherine. She would be surprised to see her name on that list. Her husband, Martin Luther, always seemed to be the center of attention.

Catherine had been placed in a convent while still a child, and became a nun at the age of 15. As the Reformation progressed, some convents closed and the nuns were released. Martin Luther took on the task of finding husbands for these nuns. He was successful for all but three, including Catherine. She was almost married once, but it didn't work out. A second suitor was found but was rejected by Catherine. She told Luther's friend to stop looking for others. She wanted to marry Martin Luther. They were married in June of 1525.

In the devotional, in the daily prayer assigned to Catherine's birthday, it reads in part, "You raised up Your servant Katharina to support her husband in the task to reform and renew Your church." Luther was consumed by his work, so managing the household, including their six children as well as finances, was left to Catherine. Martin was involved with various groups of people, and would often bring them home, unannounced, for dinner. Catherine handled it well, providing the support which made his work possible. At some point Luther would write, "I have a pious, faithful wife, on whom a man may safely rest his heart".

I think it can be safely said that Luther wouldn't have been Luther without Catherine at his side. I know that times have changed and it's a different world now, but the same can be said of Christian marriages today, a husband and his wife complete one another under God's blessings.
